Unfortunately the odd denomination note did not find favour with the masses and was rejected and eventually withdrawn from circulation. Also on display are the very large size Rs 1000 Rupee notes that were demonitised by the Moraji Desai government. Over 100+ dealer stalls

were exhibiting and sold their wares. The show had representation from all over



the country. Also, at the 3day coin show was an auc-tion of coins and banknotes on Friday and Saturday. Over 1,600 different items

went under the hammer over the three day auction, spanning from the begin-nings of Indian coinage, a silver punched mark coin about 2,400 years old from about 2,400 years old from the Magadha Janapada pe-riod. These coins are esti-mated as low as Rs 3,000 ranging to Rs. 20,000. 1700 year old gold coins of Kushan Emperor and Em-peror Chandra Gupta esti-mated from as low as Rs. 50,000 to the rarer variant for More than 100 exhibitor's from all over the country were selling their wares. Over 1600 items went under that hammer.
